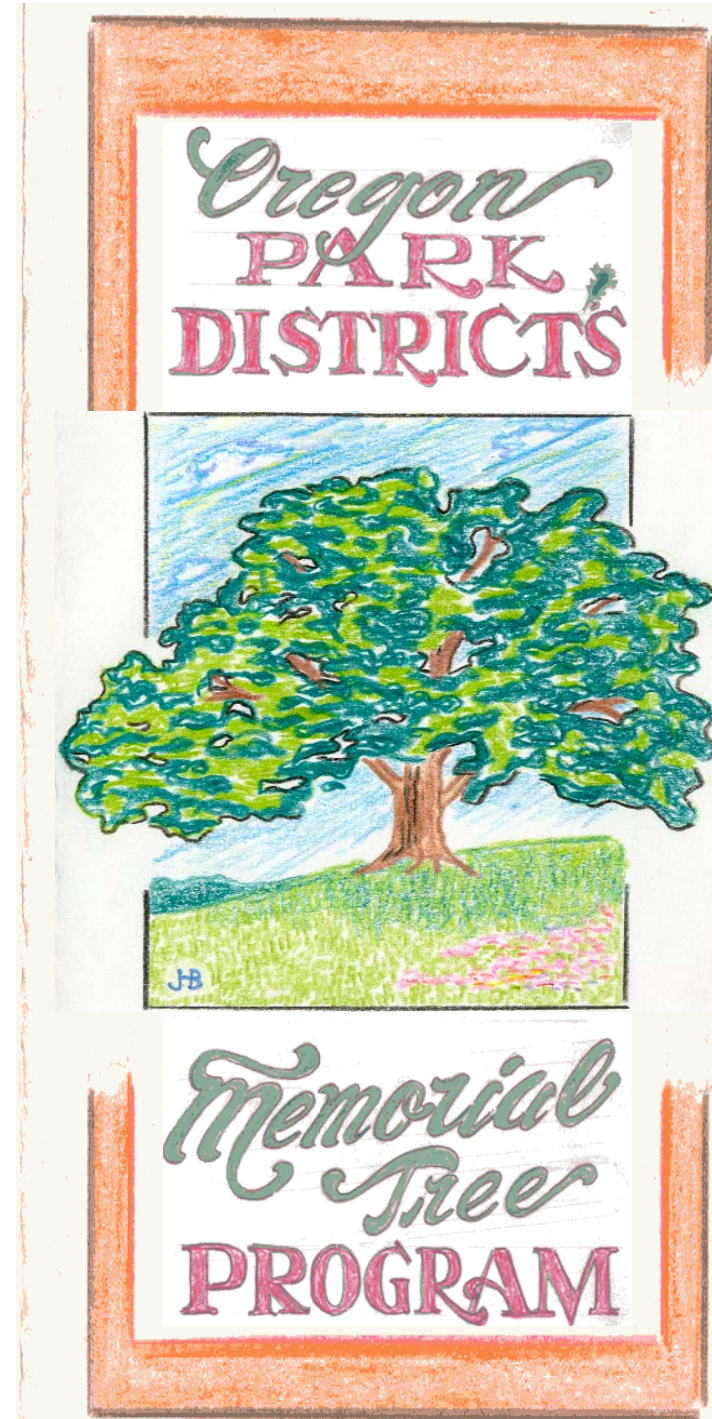

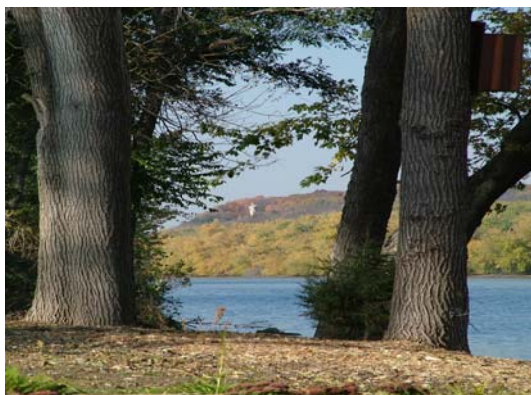

Trees may be purchased from the Oregon Park District to plant as a memorial to a loved one. Plant a natural monument in memory of a loved one, in celebration of a newborn, or any other special occasion. Trees in parks help reduce noise pollution and water runoff to protect adjacent areas, thus enhancing the environment. Exact locations in each park will be left to the discretion of the Parks Department. Tree varieties are determined on a seasonal basis.

Tree Varieties

Bur Oak

(Quercus macrocarpa):

Height: 55' Spread 45' Rate: Slow
Dark green foliage that turns yellow-brown in fall. Deeply ridged and furrowed bark.

Red Oak

(Quercus rubra):

Height: 50' Spread 45' Rate: Fast
Dark green foliage turning russet-red to bright red in fall. One of the fastest growing oaks.

Swamp White Oak

(Quercus bicolor):

Height: 45' Spread 45' Rate: Medium
Yellow-brown to reddish fall color. Flaky grayish brown bark. Ideal for wet conditions.

White Ash

(Fraxinusa americana):

Height: 45' Spread 305' Rate: Medium
Dark green foliage turning to deep purple and maroon colors in fall. Develops an open round crown at maturity.

Green Ash

(Fraxinus pennsylvanica):

Height: 50' Spread 35' Rate: Fast
Glossy medium to dark green turning yellow in fall. Tolerant of many soil conditions and is very adaptable.

Tree Varieties (cont.)

Sugar Maple

(Acer saccharum):

Height: 50' Spread 40' Rate: Slow
Medium to dark green foliage turning yellow, orange and red in fall. Noted for its beautiful fall colors.

Kentucky Coffee

(Gymnocladus dioicus):

Height: 50' Spread 35' Rate: Medium
Green foliage turning yellow in the fall. Produces a 5"-6" blackish brown pod that persists through winter.

Hackberry

(Celtis occidentalis):

Height: 50' Spread 40' Rate: Medium
Dull green foliage that develops into an Yellow to yellow-green color. White flowers develop in mid spring.

- Oak trees are available during the spring season only
- Tree varieties may change due to availability.
- Trees will be tagged and numbered for easy identification
- The Park District will notify the contact person after the tree is planted.
- Due to liability, we ask that visitors are not on site during planting of the tree.
